Summer 2021 and Fall 2021 Schedule of Courses

In response to ongoing uncertainty about the feasibility or advisability of travel, Bexley Seabury has moved all courses to an all-online format through Fall 2021. Due to the temporary move to all fully online courses, we will be offering summer courses online in two three-week sessions, one in June and one in July. In light of the rise in Covid-19 cases in mid- to late-summer, the Seminary determined it would be best to move all Fall 2021 courses fully online, as well. Most of these courses will run for 14 weeks. See the Fall 2021 schedule below for details.

The information included below provides scheduling details for each of the courses we are offering in Summer and Fall 2021. All times are listed in **CENTRAL TIME**. All of the courses will require asynchronous work (work completed individually by the student, according to a schedule outlined for the course), and many will include synchronous sessions (the class meeting online together at the same time, usually through Zoom). Full information regarding schedules for individual courses will be posted in course syllabi and Canvas course sites.

Following the course details for each term/semester, we have included a calendar of synchronous sessions to help students map their plans for synchronous online work and travel, if applicable. This may be especially helpful to students taking more than one course.

¹ Summer intensive courses usually require pre-reading and pre-work prior to the start of the term, including initial and introductory assignments. Students are encouraged to begin reading as soon as they are able and to use the Reading Week/Week 0 to catch up on pre-reading and pre-work before the course begins. SUMMER COURSES AND DATES

Summer 1 Courses (June 7-25; Reading Week June 1-6)

Art of Preaching (ML 332; 3 credits)

Preachers are asked to be writers, actors/performance artists, composers, dancers, painters and sculptors all at one time, yet they are rarely given the tools they need to make good on these expectations. What if preachers thought of themselves as creative artists who employ many artistic disciplines to craft and deliver their sermons? This course is open to beginning, intermediate, and advanced preachers who would like to draw both their preparation and execution from the right sides of their brains.

Reimagining Congregations in Mission (ML 560/660; 3 credits)

“Reimagining Congregations in Mission” explores inherited assumptions and patterns of Christian congregational life and their relation to the *missio Dei* in light of rapidly changing contexts and accelerating congregational irrelevance. Intercultural and postcolonial perspectives on missional ecclesiology, a theology of companionship and cultural humility offer a framework for renewing congregational identity and practice. We will use the Intercultural Development Inventory, interviews with innovative practitioners, readings, and case studies to equip learners to analyze their own context missionally and to imagine and engage processes of congregational change.

Note: This course counts as a Practical Theology or Congregational Mission and Leadership area elective for DAS students.

Leading Non-profits in the 21st Century (ML 580/680; 3 credits)

Nonprofit organizations face many challenges, not the least of which is the ability to be financially stable and grow in meaningful and appropriate ways. In the 21st Century, it is clear that the ability to articulate and “live” one’s mission is intrinsically connected with financial sustainability. More and more, we are seeing that this applies to nonprofits of all sizes and shapes, including churches and religious-based organizations. We face an uncertain future in all respects. And this uncertainty calls for thoughtful, well-informed leadership and stewardship. Church leaders, especially clergy, must understand what this means for them. In particular, this includes establishing and maintaining the cornerstones of an effectively managed organization with focus on:

- What it means to be a nonprofit
- Clear roles and responsibilities
- Well-articulated and shared vision, mission and plans
- Consistent and thoughtful ways of engaging parishioners, community members and others
- Types and features of organizational budgets: program, operating, capital, cash flow
- Calculating full costs for organizational sustainability
- Managing a budget throughout the fiscal year
- Principles and challenges of raising revenues
- How leaders live, work and guide the organizations for which they are responsible

Dates: June 7-25, with reading week June 1-6; Synchronous sessions Tuesdays and Fridays, June 8, 11, 15, 18, 22, and 25 from 10:00 am – 1:00 pm CT

Note: This course counts as a Congregational Mission and Leadership area elective for DAS students.

NEW COURSE:

Hebrew Bible II: The Writings of the Prophets and the Sages

This will be an 8-week course over June and July

An historical, literary, and theological exploration of the prophetic and wisdom texts of the Hebrew Bible. The focus of the course is careful reading of the biblical texts, with an eye toward their major themes, motifs, and historical contexts. To aid us in our endeavors, we will engage a range of classical and contemporary interpretations, including Rabbinic and Patristic readings, as well as interpretations from feminist and postcolonial contexts. Assignments emphasize the work of careful reading (exegesis) and the task of clear, contextual communication (hermeneutics).

Dates: June 7-July 30 (8 weeks); The instructor and students will set a regular day/time for synchronous sessions that is mutually agreeable.

Note: This course will fulfill the Interpreting the Hebrew Bible 2 MDiv requirement usually fulfilled through CTS.

Summer 2 Courses (July 12-30; Reading Week July 6-11)

Indigenous People and the Doctrine of Discovery (CC 422/622; 3 credits)

This multi-media course uses native voices to define the Doctrine of Discovery and its devastating effects on Indigenous peoples today. It surveys options for justice and reconciliation and honors native spirituality, resilience, and sacred connections with God and the earth.

Dates: July 12-30, with reading week July 6-11; Synchronous sessions Mondays, July 12, 19, and 26, 6:00 – 7:30 pm CT

Note: This course counts as an elective for DMin and masters-level students. For MDiv students, this course will fulfill the Cross-Cultural or Congregational Leadership and Development elective or count as a general elective. For DAS students, this course will fulfill a Congregational Mission and Leadership or a Religious Expressions and Contemporary Cultures area requirement.

Pastoral Offices (ML 402; 3 credits)

This course provides an introduction to the history, purpose and liturgical forms of the pastoral offices in use in the Episcopal Church, including rites of passage, rites of commitment, and rites of reconciliation and restoration. Each of these examinations will emphasize the pastoral, cultural, and theological aspects of the rite, and its adaptation to meet pastoral needs within a diversity of contexts. We will begin with the Book of Common Prayer, but will quickly expand our work to include additional authorized materials and additional materials that can assist us in customizing our repertoire to meet the needs of diverse communities. We will also recognize that our pastoral role extends outside of the church properly so called and consider other ways in which we exercise pastoral care for the community through public prayer and witness in myriad settings. Throughout the course, we will pay close attention to issues of enculturation and social context as we discuss the sometimes competing pastoral needs that arise across multigenerational relational systems.

Dates: July 12-30, with reading week July 6-11; Synchronous sessions Tuesdays, July 13, 20, and 27, 7:00 pm – 9:00 pm CT

Note: This course is open to masters-level students only. This course counts as a general elective for MDiv students and as a Practical Theology elective for DAS students.

FALL 2021 COURSES AND DATES

All Fall courses will meet for 14 weeks, from September 7 to December 11, with the exception of Anglican Formation and Constitution and Canons. (See dates for these courses below.)

A few Fall 2021 courses will be entirely asynchronous, meaning that students will engage course materials, peers, and their instructor online on their own time according to a schedule outlined for the course. This engagement usually takes place through Canvas, our learning management system. Fully asynchronous courses do not require students to be online at the same time for Zoom sessions. Many of the Fall 2021 courses include a mix of asynchronous work as described above, and scheduled synchronous sessions where students meet together at the same time, usually through Zoom.

DMin Course

Congregational Study (ML 689)

DMin students begin work on a Congregational Study during the second summer of their program, with the final study due on December 15 of that year. Students register to receive 1 credit for completion of the Congregational Study during the fall semester of their second year.

Dates: Work on the study begins in late summer, with the study due December 15.

NEW COURSE:

Leadership in Ministry (ML 662A; 1 credit)

This course is conducted in concert with the yearly Leadership Series offered by Healthy Congregations, Inc. It is offered online throughout the year from September through May. “Leadership in Ministry” is an opportunity for Bexley Seabury students to join with leaders across professions (pastors, religious leaders, educators, administrators, and health professionals) to enrich and expand their ability to apply principles of systems thinking to self, family, and organizations.

The year is composed of eight one-day seminars that promote in-depth thinking about self, family, and organizational process through the lens of Bowen Family Systems Theory. Practical application of theory through working with a coach for an extended period of time is part of the experience.

Dates: September 7 through December 11 (14 weeks); full course experience continues through May 2022; students choose either an asynchronous or synchronous online experience

Synchronous online option: Orientation Thursday, 9/23 5:30-8:00 pm CT and Friday, 9/24, 8:00-11:00 am CT, with monthly sessions on Thursdays listed below from 12:00-3:30 pm CT. (10/21, 11/18, 1/20, 2/17, 3/17, 4/28, May date yet to be determined because of guest presenter’s schedule)

Notes: Available to DMin in Congregational Development students only. This course counts as an elective for DMin students. The full course experience continues in Spring 2022 with ML 662B (2 credits). Students should register for both the fall and spring courses to receive elective credit for this course.

Masters-level Courses

History of Christianity: New Testament to Present (HT 310; 3 credits)

This foundational course will cover significant developments and influential figures from the early church to the present.

Instructor: Thomas Ferguson

Dates: September 7 through December 11 (14 weeks); This course involves asynchronous work according to a weekly schedule.

Notes: This course counts as a History and Theology elective for DAS students.

Anglican Theology and Ethics (HT 341; 3 credits)

In this course students learn about the distinctive history of Anglican theology and its dynamic, diverse, contemporary practice. The focus will be on engaging primary texts in their historical context, as well as making sense of such texts for today's church. We will also examine Anglican thinking about the good life, especially in its connection with worship, the sacraments, and its outworking in everyday life.

Dates: September 7 through December 11 (14 weeks); Required synchronous sessions 10/1-10/2 (full day with breaks) and Tuesdays 9/21, 10/12, 11/9, 11/30, 12/7, 7:30-9:00 pm CT; recommended sync session Tuesday, 9/7 7:30-9:00 pm CT.

Anglican Liturgy and Music: Development and Theology (ML 301; 3 credits)

This course is an introduction to the principles and practices of Anglican worship with a particular focus on the Episcopal Church. The course will cover the nature of worship and the history of its evolution; and the theology and use of music in worship.

Dates: September 7 through December 11 (14 weeks); Synchronous sessions on Saturdays, 9/11, 9/25, 10/9, 10/23, 11/6, 11/20, and 12/11 from 10:00 am – 12:30 pm CT.

Field Education 2 (ML 322; 3 credits)

This semester of Field Education integrates the practical, personal experience of ministry in the mission field with theoretical methodology introduced in the classroom. Field sites will provide students an opportunity to explore ministry under the supervision of experienced, ordained leaders in collaboration with lay committees.

Instructor: KJ Oh and Eileen Shanley-Roberts

Dates: September 7 through December 11 (14 weeks); Synchronous sessions every Thursday from 9/8 through 12/11 (except 11/25; 13 sessions total) from 11:00 am-12:30 pm CT OR 7:00 – 8:30 pm CT.

Notes: Open only to Bexley Seabury MDiv students.

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Field Education 4 (ML 324; 1 credit)

A continuation of Field Education 3, this course provides an opportunity for those in field placements to reflect on lessons learned. Topics include everything from the basics of running a vestry meeting, planning a funeral, and reading a spreadsheet to the broader issues of leading and managing adaptive change, and how the Church might function in a rapidly changing cultural landscape.

Instructor: KJ Oh and Eileen Shanley-Roberts

Dates: September 7 through December 11 (14 weeks); Synchronous sessions Mondays, 9/20, 10/18, 11/15, and 12/6, from 7:00 – 8:30 pm CT

Notes: Open only to Bexley Seabury MDiv students.

Constitution and Canons (ML 335; 1 credit)

This course covers the basics of the canon law and polity of The Episcopal Church. This course meets ordination requirements in The Episcopal Church.

Instructor: Thomas Ferguson

Dates: September 7 through October 26 (6 weeks plus a final exam period); This course involves asynchronous work according to a weekly schedule.

Pastoral Theology (ML 336; 3 credits)

This course offers a holistic view of caring ministries focusing on the ultimate meaning and concerns of human beings. Pastoral Theology will focus on the spiritual/theological needs of persons as well as on emotional and systemic concerns. The appropriate balance of listening and speaking when providing care are central to the course. Students will be introduced to a variety of contexts for care: within specialized ministry settings; around various addictions; transitions in personal and congregational life; family, individual or community crisis; death and dying; mental emotional illness; and referral. *Contact Dr. Ott to register (eott@bexleyseabury.edu). One prior unit of CPE preferred.*

Dates: September 7 through December 11 (14 weeks); Synchronous sessions Friday 9/17 1:00-4:00 pm, Saturday 9/18, 2:00-5:00 pm, as well as Fridays 10/15 & 11/5 3:00-6:00 pm and Saturdays 10/16 & 11/6 9:00 am-12:00 pm

Notes: This course counts as a Practical Theology elective for DAS students.

Preaching the Synoptic Gospels (ML 434; 3 credits)

The shift from the historic one-year lectionary to the three-year lectionary in the mid-20th Century created a liturgical year for each of the synoptic gospels. This means that the church is now shaped by the particular visions of the communities of Matthew, Mark and Luke for a year at a time, yet too often this opportunity is overlooked or deliberately ignored. Preachers continue to “harmonize” the gospels, often bringing in details of the story of Jesus from another synoptic gospel or simply preaching the version of a story they like the best (for instance, Luke’s generous story of a grand banquet versus Matthew’s harsh one). This practice not only falsifies the intent of the gospel’s writer(s) but misses the chance to understand the very specific theology

of each gospel and its implications for Christian living today. This course will separate angels and shepherds from stars and Magi, earthquakes from a young man in white, and Mary Magdalene from Mary of Bethany, all in pursuit of a three-year vision for preaching the synoptics that has immediate implications for adult education and ministry in the wider context of the parish.

Dates: September 7 through December 11 (14 weeks); Synchronous sessions Wednesdays 7:00-9:00 pm CT and Saturdays 10:00 am-1:00 pm CT on 9/22, 9/25, 10/27, 10/30, 12/1, and 12/4

Note: The Art of Preaching (or an introductory preaching course) is a prerequisite for this masters-level elective course. Students who have completed an introductory preaching course elsewhere should confirm this with their advisor for approval to register for this course. Non-degree or cross-registered students should confirm with the Bexley Seabury registrar that they have completed an introductory preaching course. This course counts as a general elective for MDiv students and, will fulfill a Practical Theology area requirement DAS students. Students who have completed an introductory preaching course elsewhere should confirm this with their advisor for approval to register for this course. An earlier version of this schedule incorrectly listed Friday as a meeting day instead of Saturday.

Anglican Formation (PSF 300; 0 credits)

Anglican Formation provides students with the opportunity to cultivate three fundamental spiritual tools common to the Anglican Tradition: first, intentional participation in community; second, theological self-reflection; and third, fluent conversation between scripture and daily life experience. The course is designed to support and stretch students throughout their seminary experience by developing effective strategies for forming personal, spiritual, and relational support in ministry.

Dates: Online retreat August 28–29; Online through December 11 (14 weeks + retreat); Synchronous sessions on Mondays, 10/4, 11/1, and 11/29 from 7:00 – 9:00 pm CT.

Notes: The course is required for students in the MDiv program and other students (e.g., students in the DAS program) who have permission from the director of formation. MDiv students must register for this course every fall and spring in which they are enrolled. DAS students who are interested in taking Anglican Formation should talk with their advisor and contact Eileen Shanley-Roberts for more information (eshanleyroberts@bexleyseabury.edu).
